After Graduation

What will you do when you graduate?

It is a wise idea to think about what you will do and where you will go once you graduate from the University of Washington – long before you graduate. Planning for and setting professional goals can be a daunting task. If you wait until your final quarter at the UW you might end up in a job you don't like. And don't stop with "I'm going to graduate school." or "I'm going to take a year off and figure out what I want to do." Those are fine starting points, but they are very far from the end of your journey. Your mantra should be: "Start early and figure out the details."

The Office of Student and Academic Services can help you, but there are lots of other resources at the UW. **The Counseling Center** in 401 Schmitz Hall provides career counseling. The **Career Center** in 134 MGH has advisers who will work with you to decide on a career, and then teach you how to be the most effective applicant possible. The **Carlson Center** has community service opportunities to explore careers and build your resume – most of them for academic credit.

There are several suggestions for students using environmental sciences as career preparation:

- Choose environmental science and resource management electives which build a common core related to career goals. The SEFS department also has four transcription options in ESRM that allow for further specialization.
- Complete courses from other departments relating to career interests. Some
 UW departments offer minors that may be appropriate (you may petition up to
 7 credits outside of ESRM using the following form:

- Take basic skill and job-related skill courses such as writing, accounting, computers, or human resources.
- Do an internship to get experience in your chosen area. Look for these opportunities on the blog: http://uwsfr.wordpress.com/

If a graduate degree is in your plans, talk with an adviser during Fall Quarter of your junior year. Applications require extensive planning. The process should begin at least one year prior to the quarter in which you are seeking admissions. Talk with your TAs and professors regarding prospective schools.
