As the Forest and Fish Rule, passed by the Washington State Legislature, reaches its one-year anniversary, private forest landowners in Washington are laboring to understand and comply with the law. State agencies entrusted with the responsibility of interpreting environmental laws and creating regulations have only started to bring the intent of new laws into practice. In concert with the recent evolution of environmental regulations, several state and federally funded programs, designed to support private landowners, have taken shape.
